PERSONNEL

Salary, fringe benefits, and overtime for two (2) municipal police investigators who will be designated as Crime Scene Investigators for the City of Anderson.

TRAVEL

Mileage: Estimated mileage of 10,000 miles per officer per year. These miles will be traveled to carry out the duties of the job and to go to any training courses offered to enhance the job.

Lodging and per diem: Needed for out-of-town training and investigations.

Airfare: Two (2) round trip tickets per year for each investigator in the unit to use for transportation to at least two (2) national training classes per year on Crime Scene Investigations.

EQUIPMENT

Crime Scene Response Vehicle & Accessories: A vehicle (van or SUV) for each investigator to be outfitted with accessories which may include a light bar, siren, striping, console, long barrel gun (and rack), cage, and etc. This will be necessary for each investigator to carry its equipment to and from the crime scenes. This includes vehicle emergency equipment.

Vehicle Radio: Mobile radios for the investigators (1 in each vehicle) to permit the investigators the ability to communicate with other officers and the department.

Walkie-Talkie: A walkie-Talkie for each investigator to be able to maintain communication with the police department, other investigators and Anderson County Central Dispatch while out of the vehicle (for officer safety).

Computer System: A computer system (either a desktop, laptop or mobile system), computer software, printer and possibly docking stations with monitors for each member of the unit to allow each investigator to prepare paperwork required by the department, maintain performance reports, track court proceedings, and devise lesson plans on Crime Scene Investigation to be presented to other department officers and officers from other agencies who attend the training sessions.

Downflow Fingerprinting Workstation: The down flow workstation is necessary to provide a work surface for the application of latent powders while containing the resulting dust associated with this type of process. The table provides a stable work area with adequate illumination so that the operator and adjacent work areas are protected from the resulting powder residue.

Cyanoacrylate Fuming Chamber: The cyanoacrylate fuming chamber is required to prevent the operator from exposure to the cyanoacrylate fumes which are an inhalation hazard. Proper humidity and exposure are very important in this process and this chamber monitors and adjusts this filtration of the fumes automatically.

Video Enhancement Workstation: The video enhancement workstation will be necessary to transfer the video evidence into a digital form where it may be enhanced to provide detail to the analog and digital video evidence. This enhancement will provide still images, deplex a multiplexed tape to view video, convert video, expose video images outside of the normal area, prepare courtroom exhibits for trial and enhance audio tracks.

Digital Image Storage System: The digital image storage system will secure storage for digital images so that the originals can be authenticated and those enhanced for identification purposes can be documented as to what enhancements were made for court purposes. All originals will be secured with any activity such as viewing and printing logged.

Network Server: A server is required to run the CSI software to store the data. The information will be transferred electronically and stored in-house so that an exact duplicate may be retrieved immediately of all the data input on Forensic Mapping software system. Accurate documentation and case file evidence reports plus visuals will no longer have to be pulled manually and the probability of misplacement of evidence documents will no longer be a

factor in case presentation. The fingerprint images from the Live Scan and the latent prints will be electronically transmitted to the server and stored in the appropriate case. This will allow for all case file information to be in one location with immediate retrieval. The server will eliminate the manual search of case file information and will reduce the time in processing case information.

Network Printer: A network printer of high quality resolution is requested for the investigators to print photos of evidence and other pertinent data regarding crime scene investigation.

Forensic Mapping System: The forensic mapping system is a combination of an electronic distance measuring instrument and theodolite which determines a distance and angle between itself and a point of interest such as blood spatter, skid marks, shell casings, weapon placement, etc.

Evidence Drying Cabinet: The evidence drying cabinet is required to provide a secure area for the biohazard type evidence and for the drying of wet evidence while preventing the possibility of cross contamination. This system eliminates personnel exposure to putrid odors of decomposition and harmful bacteria or viruses. Decontamination of the evidence drying cabinet between cases eliminates residual DNA that may affect subsequent serology.

Forensic Alternate Light Source: The alternate forensic light system will have the ability to continuously tune its spectral output giving the operator full control in obtaining the most ideal conditions for the detection, photography, and recovery of evidence and will be capable of adjusting the bandwidth of its output to create contrast between the evidence and any background.

OTHER

Registration fees: To be paid for training courses offered to the Crime Scene Investigative Unit. All grant funded personnel will attend a minimum of 2 classes each year that specialize in Crime Scene Investigations, Crime Scene Analysis or related topics as pre-approved by the SCDPS.

Clothing Allowance: To be used for the investigators to purchase and maintain the proper attire for required duties.

CSI Protective Uniform Gear: Protective CSI uniforms will readily identify the members of the CSI Unit. Crime scenes are secured areas that only CSI investigators are allowed to process for evidence gathering. This protective gear will also be worn for the protection of hazardous evidence and items that will need to be handled at the scene. (Officer safety)

Crime Scene Supplies, Kits & Operating Supplies: Non-office supplies necessary for the day-to-day operation of the CSI Unit including but not limited to a Cadaver Taking Kit (a combo for or including fingerprint treatment & restoration), a Postmortem Horizontal Finger Print Rolling System (for recording fingerprints), a master Powder processing kit (to collect latent prints), an Evidence Collection Kit w/ Accessories (minimum 3-drawer, includes markers, flashlight, china markers, SS & plastic tweezers, has a carrying case w/ additional drawers.), a Blood Spatter Kit (for blood spatter recovery & analysis), a Forensic Mini-Kit (for luminol tools to be used to check for microscopic presence of blood), a Phenolphthalein Presumptive Blood Test Kit (to verify existence of human blood), and a Cargo Case (to carry various & sundry items together in 1 unit into a crime scene).

Lockable file cabinets: To store documents, correspondence, and other important reports for Crime Scene case files.

Law Enforcement Accessories: To complete the Law Enforcement Uniform. Includes (but not limited to) badge, leather and/or Velcro attachments such as duty belt & holster, cuffs & case, pepper spray, flashlight, baton, medals, pins & medallions, etc.

Shotgun for Vehicle: To purchase a shotgun and a shotgun rack for each vehicle in the unit. (Officer Safety)

Fax-Machine/Scanner/Copier (Combined): Fax: To allow the investigator(s) the ability to quickly transfer case files from the police department to the Solicitor's Office and other departments, thereby saving valuable time and making the unit more efficient; Scanner: for each Investigator to allow the unit to quickly input necessary forms, documents, case files, notes, and photos into the computer system to efficiently compile prosecutorial folders that will be utilized in court hearings and prosecutions; Copier: For the investigators to make needed copies of case files for the Solicitor's Office and the police department.

Cell Phone and Service: To be used by each investigator to return calls to Prosecuting Attorneys, Victims and others as needed.

Beeper: To purchase beepers and pay the monthly fee for beepers which will allow the department to have contact with the investigative unit at all times.

Office Supplies: For the unit to use in the performance of their duties. Examples: paper, folders, pencils, pens, calendars, staple gun, staples, diskettes, hole puncher, etc.

Evidence Bags: Several sizes of evidence bags as authorized by the City of Anderson Police Department Forensic Evidence Unit to be used to properly collect, log, and preserve evidence to be later analyzed and used to prosecute offenders.

Personal Recorder: To allow the CS Investigators to make verbal notes while walking through a crime scene. This will allow for more efficient evaluation of crime scenes and provide a medium for later review that is in addition to written notes.

Personal Recorder Cassettes: High quality cassettes for use by the investigators while gathering evidence for use in prosecution.

Computer Supplies: Up to two (2) sets of computer ink cartridges per printer to replace the printers' factory installed cartridges when they require replacing and other miscellaneous computer supplies.

Digital Storage Device(s): Blank Video Tapes or a digital storage device or medium to store videos of crime scenes and interviews with victims and defendants in order to build stronger cases and reduce overall victim interviews

Camcorder or Digital Video Recorder: One (1) video camera (camcorder) per investigator to allow the unit to film crime scenes and victim, witness, and interrogational type interviews, thereby helping to build stronger cases.

Digital Camera & Accessories: One (1) per Investigator to be used by the unit to gather and document evidence by photographing crime scenes and the victim's injuries.

Digital Storage Medium: To be used by the unit in the digital camera to gather and document evidence by photographing evidence and crime scenes.

Firearm: A service weapon for each officer in the unit to carry while on duty.

Printer for Still Pictures from Video: A printer to produce still pictures from videos recorded in banks, stores and other businesses that video tape and/or digitally record criminal activity.

Body Armor: A "Bullet Proof Vest" for each officer in the unit to wear while on duty. This is for officer safety.

Desk & Chair: One set (desk & chair) for each personnel to allow them to have a place in the office to work on their cases.

PROJECT PURPOSE

Broad Goals

The ultimate goal in the gathering of forensic evidence in the City of Anderson is to combine resources with other agencies to form a strong Crime Scene Investigative Unit and to provide a unified approach to combating crime by discovering, identifying, and properly collecting and preserving vital evidence in crime scene investigations. The services of this unit would establish uniformity of forensic services throughout the Greater-Anderson Area with the objective of achieving consistency in the recognition and preservation of physical evidence that will yield reliable information throughout all aspects of the investigation. The support and capabilities of this unit will clearly advance the successful prosecution and conviction of a criminal offender.

The primary purpose of this program is to improve investigations of Crimes Scenes, especially scenes that involved violent activity. Through increased resources and the exercise of the department's Mutual Aid Agreements with other agencies, coordination of investigations as well as department sponsored training will increase the number of officers with specialized skills in handling Crime Scene Investigations. A secondary purpose is to take a proactive stance in an effort to prevent further victimization by extensively following up on Crime Scenes that involve burglaries, break-ins and/or violent criminal activity in an effort to prosecute and more offenders, get them longer sentences and thereby make the Greater-Anderson Area less crime-prone.

Specific Plan

The following tasks and activities will be employed to aggressively investigate Crime Scenes.

1. The Crime Scene Unit will be housed in the City of Anderson Police Department headquarters and will use the current space available. The Lieutenant of the Investigative Services Division (ISD) will supervise the administrative matters and the day to day operations to ensure cohesiveness and communication. The Lieutenant and the Project Director will initiate recruitment and hiring of the Crime Scene Investigators. They will solicit bids for the procurement of equipment. Weekly meetings will be required for all of the Crime Scene Unit to share information. Statistical information will be logged and input into a software system to report and collect data for grant purposes and documentation for court presentations. The Crime Scene Unit will respond to crime scenes on a 24 hour basis with officers working full time on two shifts a day and on an on-call basis during off hours.

2. Policies and procedures (aka General Orders) will be developed and implemented. The increased manpower will enable us to research and select processes and procedures suggested by both the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division. Standard procedures and guidelines for evidence recovery operations will be followed to insure uniformity in systematic stages to preserve evidence for court presentation.

The Crime Scene Investigative Unit will greatly increase the minimum work efforts provided to the citizens that we serve.

3. The following evidence recovery operational stages will be implemented so that the search for evidence will be organized and performed in a legal manner (3A - 3C):

3A. **PREPARATION:** The collection of evidence will require the necessary preparation of packaging materials, all forms for documentation, search warrants, prior supervisory scene selection, hazardous materials safety, and organization of communication services.

3B. **EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM:** The basic stages for the processing of a crime scene are: safety, security, survey & evaluation of evidence, narrative description, scene photography, diagram & sketching, conducting a detailed search, recording & physical evidence collection, final survey, and the release of the crime scene.

3C. **DOCUMENTATION PROCEDURES FOR EVIDENCE RECOVERY:** There are four categories for documentation that must be applied to any search: Administrative worksheet, narrative description, diagram & sketch and evidence recovery log.

4. Grant personnel will attend the International Association for Identification Annual Conference. They will also be

attending the Practical Homicide Training Class offered through the Public Agency Training Council. This class is taught by Vernon Geberth, who is nationally known as an expert in the field of homicide and death investigation, along with crime processing and evidence collection. Specific courses of instruction will further be attended as it relates directly to any specialized equipment obtained through the grant. Grant personnel will in turn, share the knowledge received from these courses with the Police Department officers and/or interested law enforcement agencies within the County of Anderson.

5. A formalized "In-House" training plan will be made available to the Crime Scene Investigation Unit. The training courses will include classroom instruction and hands-on training applications. These formalized training plans with multiple components will be taught to the CSI Unit on a quarterly basis and monthly when classes are scheduled. The agencies within Anderson County and the surrounding counties will be offered training at no cost as a means of performing a unified approach to properly investigating crime scenes. The City of Anderson Police Department will partner with the Federal Bureau of investigation (FBI), the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF), the State Attorney General's Office (AGO) and other agencies to make available to the CSI Unit the needed specialized training in the basic and advanced technology used in the gathering of evidence.

1. Increase the identification and apprehension of criminal offenders in the City of Anderson.
2. Establish a written, standardized protocol to ensure the quality and uniformity of evidence collection, preservation, analysis and report writing in the City of Anderson.
3. Increase the knowledge of the Crime Scene Investigator/s.
4. Facilitate the process of criminal cases through the court system.
5. Increase the coordination and cooperation among criminal justice agencies and the court system.

PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

1. A detailed log will be kept of all cases involving the City of Anderson Crime Scene Investigative Unit. These logs will include case numbers, date, location, agencies involved, type of crime, etc.
2. Standardized reporting forms, policies, and procedures will be written and required for all evidence collection and preservation for the Crime Scene Unit and all other participating agencies. These systematic procedures will be required for all phases of crime scene investigations and will be logged as such.
3. All grant funded Crime Scene Investigative Unit certified officers will be required to attend at least two training courses per year pertaining to the area of crime scenes. A record of each grant-funded officer's training will be kept, which will include the officer's name, course name, date and place held, and a summary of the training.

5. The City of Anderson ISD Lieutenant will maintain a record of all Mutual Aid Agreements with all other agencies and coordinate Memorandum(s) of Understanding(s) with other agencies, including the Anderson County Sheriff's Office, for combining CSI services and sharing resources.

The Lieutenant of Investigations, Supervisors, and the Project Director will compile information. Detailed training records will be kept by the Project Director for each training course that is attended and on the classes taught as a result of grant training. The knowledge received from these courses will be shared at roll call meetings. Specialized training will be held to share training information received from the training courses. Training materials will be distributed to participants to keep them abreast with the training received. Surveys will be taken at the end of each training session and critiqued for future training; Minutes of the CSI meetings, lesson plans, and training survey results will be maintained and will be included in the Progress Reports for grant information. Other pertinent information relating to case findings and newspaper articles will be placed in the file and used as additional evaluation tools. These records will be reviewed by the investigators, the ISD Lieutenant, and the Project Director.

A review of the data for statistical purposes and the summary of activities for each case will be retrieved and evaluated. This information will be submitted as part of the Progress Report and the year-end evaluation will be compiled by the Lieutenant and the Project Director.

The Project Director will evaluate the project based upon the above information and on the objectives and performance indicators and the impact it has made on the community. TRAINING PLAN:

The investigators will attend two (2) or more Crime Scene Investigation Training Courses and/or seminars during the grant-funded years. This may include training courses through the SCCJA, IPTM, and training courses offered through the St. Petersburg Community College. National courses (offered by entities outside of South Carolina) and training will also be attended. Examples of National Organizations that offer education and training in conducting investigations into Crime Scene Investigation are the Federal Bureau of Investigations' facility at Quantico, the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center, and the Gatlinburg Law Enforcement Conference. (This list is not all-inclusive.) If time permits, the grant-funded investigators will attend computer training class(es) to establish computer skills proficiency.

The following courses will be taught to the CSI Unit and offered to all law enforcement agencies in City of Anderson, the surrounding areas, and to other law enforcement agencies.

CRIME SCENE UNIT STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES: The student will be taught standard uniform processes and procedures to include standardized forms for evidence collection and investigation.

EVIDENCE RECOGNITION AND PROCEDURES: This course will cover basic crime scene diagramming, sketching and techniques in measurement to produce drawings.

BLOOD SPATTER RECOGNITION AND APPLICATION: This course will provide the student with the understanding and the recognition of blood spatter evidence. The student will also be taught how to utilize and incorporate this evidence in the investigation of violent crimes and the interview process related to suspects, victims and witnesses.

POWDERING AND LIFTING OF LATENT PRINTS: The student will be taught how to apply fingerprint powder to a non porous surface for the purpose of developing latent prints; the student will also be taught the proper technique in lifting latent prints utilizing various lifting materials.

LATENT PRINT DEVELOPMENT WITH CHEMICALS: The students will be taught how to apply chemicals to porous items for the purpose of developing latent prints.

CRIME SCENE DOCUMENTATION AND RECONSTRUCTION: This course will teach the basic photography of a crime scene. The basic operation of a 35 mm camera, digital camera, and video camera will be taught for clearer imaging and evidence recognition.

SUPERVISING AND MANAGEMENT OF A CRIME SCENE UNIT: This course will provide guidance in the establishment and the management of a crime scene unit.

METHAMPHETAMINE LAB EVIDENCE IDENTIFICATION, COLLECTION, AND CLEAN-UP PROCEDURES This course will provide the student with the knowledge to identify a methamphetamine laboratory and the proper collection of the materials present at the scene. The appropriate handling and clean-up procedures will be taught for evidence purposes and for officer safety.

FIREARM, ARSON, AND EXPLOSIVE RECOGNITION: The students will be taught the proper search and recognition techniques for the handling of suspicious objects, firearms, and explosive materials at a crime scene. They will also be taught to view charcoal remains and evidence at fires to detect any suspicious circumstances.

BASIC POST BLAST CRIME SCENE: Students will gain experience in processing crime scenes in which explosive devices have been used. Students will also learn to process bombings in buildings and vehicles. They will be trained in the proper collection of explosive residue, trace evidence, and contamination protocols.

FORENSIC ANTHROPOLOGY/BODY RECOVERY: Students will learn body recovery techniques and crime scene management involving human-skeletal and decomposed remains. The training will include topics such as Introduction to Forensic Anthropology, Introduction to Forensic Pathology, Introduction to Human Osteology, Forensic Entomology, Bone Trauma, Forensic Dentistry, Mass Grave Excavation and Discovery and Mapping of Clandestine Graves.

19. Utilization and Payment of Grant Funds: Funds awarded are to be expended only for purposes and activities covered by the subgrantee's approved project plan and budget. Items must be in the subgrantee's approved grant budget in order to be eligible for reimbursement. Payments will be adjusted to correct previous overpayments and disallowances or under payments resulting from audit.

Claims for reimbursement must be submitted no more frequently than once a month and no less than once a quarter.

20. 22. Reports: The subgrantee shall submit, at such times and in such form as may be prescribed, such reports as the SFA may reasonably require, including quarterly financial reports, progress reports, final financial reports and evaluation reports.

23. Program Income: All program income generated by this grant during the project must be reported to the SFA quarterly (on the quarterly fiscal report) and must be put back into the project or be used to reduce the grantor participation in the program. The use or planned use of all program income must have prior written approval from the SFA.

24. Retention of Records: Records for non-expendable property purchased totally or partially with grantor funds must be retained for three years after its final disposition. All other pertinent grant records including financial records, supporting documents and statistical records shall be retained for a minimum of three years after the final expenditure report. However, if any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the three year period, then records must be retained for three years after the litigation, claim or audit is resolved.

25. Property Control: Effective control and accountability must be maintained for all personal property. Sub-grantees must adequately safeguard all such property and must assure that it is used solely for authorized purposes. a. 28. Project Evaluation Report: The formal evaluation report must be received by the SFA not later than 45 days after the end of the grant funding period. The report is in addition to the cumulative Final Progress Report also due 45 days after the end of the grant funded period.

29. Copyright: Except as otherwise provided in the terms and conditions of this grant, the subgrantee or a contractor paid through this grant is free to copyright any books, publications or other copyrightable materials developed in the course of or under this grant. However, the federal awarding agency and/or state funding agency (SFA) reserve a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use, for federal government and/or SFA purposes:

- a. the copyright in any work developed under this grant or through a contract under this grant; and,
- b. any rights of copyright to which a subgrantee or subcontractor purchases ownership with grant support.

The federal government's rights and/or the SFA's rights identified above must be conveyed to the publisher and the language of the publisher's release form must ensure the preservation of these rights.

30. Cash Depositories: Subgrantees are required to deposit grant funds in a federally insured banking institution, and the balance exceeding insurance coverage must be collaterally secured.

31. Furniture Purchase Requirements (For State Agencies Only): The SFA requires that furniture funded by the grant (both grantor and match) be purchased through the South Carolina Department of Corrections, Prison Industries Program (PI). with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), as applicable.

The SFA may waive the requirement for submission of any specific publication upon submission of a request providing justification from the subgrantee.

41. Closed-Captioning of Public Service Announcements: Any television public service announcement that is produced or funded in whole or in part by any agency or instrumentality of Federal Government shall include closed captioning of the verbal content of such announcement.

42. Non-Profit Organization Special Requirement: In accordance with the revised OMB Circular A-110, effective February 10, 1987, non-profit organizations shall maintain advances of federal funds in interest bearing accounts. Interest amounts earned on all advances of Federal grant funds up to \$250 per fiscal year may be retained by the recipient for administrative expense. This amount is not per award but from all funds received as a result of Federal programs. Annually remit interest earned (over and above the \$250 per fiscal year) on advances of Federal grant funds to the United States Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Payment Management Services, Post Office Box 6021, Rockville, MD 20852. 43. 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47. This special condition facilitates compliance with the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) relating to clandestine methamphetamine laboratory operations, including the identification, seizure, or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories [hereinafter, "meth lab operations"]. No monies from this award may be obligated to support meth lab operations unless the grantee implements this special condition.

The Office of Justice Programs (OJP), in consultation with the Bureau of Justice Assistance, the Drug Enforcement Administration, and the Office for Community Oriented Policing Services, prepared a Program-level Environmental Assessment (Assessment) governing meth lab operations. The Assessment describes the adverse environmental, health, and safety impacts likely to be encountered by law enforcement agencies as they implement specific actions under their methamphetamine laboratory operations. Consistent with the Assessment, the following terms and conditions apply to the grantee for any OJP funded meth lab operations:

A. The grantee shall ensure compliance by OJP funded sub-grantees with federal, state and local environmental, health, and safety laws and regulations applicable to meth lab operations, to include the disposal of the chemicals, equipment, and wastes resulting from those operations.

B. The grantee shall have a Mitigation Plan in place that identifies and documents the processes and points of accountability within its state. This plan will be used to ensure that the adverse environmental, health, and safety impacts delineated in the Assessment are mitigated in a manner consistent with the requirements of this condition.

C. The grantee shall monitor OJP funded meth lab operations to ensure that they comply with the following nine mitigation measures identified in the Assessment and whose implementation is addressed in the grantee's Mitigation Plan. These mitigation measures must be included as special condition in all subgrants: (See below)

1. Provide medical screening of personnel assigned or to be assigned by the grantee to the seizure or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories;
2. Provide Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) required initial and refresher training for law enforcement officials and all other personnel assigned to either the seizure or closure of clandestine methamphetamine laboratories;
3. As determined by their specified duties; equip the personnel with OSHA required protective wear and other required safety equipment;
4. Assign properly trained personnel to prepare a comprehensive contamination report on each seized/closed laboratory;
5. Utilize qualified disposal personnel to remove all chemicals and associated glassware, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes from site(s) of each seized laboratory;
6. Dispose of the chemicals, equipment, and contaminated materials and wastes at properly licensed disposal facilities or, when allowable, at properly licensed recycling facilities;
7. Monitor the transport, disposal, and recycling components of subparagraphs numbered 5. and 6. immediately above in order to ensure proper compliance;
8. Have in place and implement a written agreement with the responsible state environmental agency. This agreement must provide that the responsible state environmental agency agrees to (i) timely evaluate the environmental condition at and around the site of a closed clandestine laboratory and (ii) coordinate with the responsible party, property owner, or others to ensure that any residual contamination is remediated, if determined necessary by the state environmental agency and in accordance with existing state and federal requirements; and
9. Have in place and implement a written agreement with the responsible state or local service agencies to properly respond to any minor, as defined by state law, at the site. This agreement must ensure immediate response by qualified personnel who can (i) respond to the potential health needs of any minor at the site; (ii) take that minor into protective custody unless the minor is criminally involved in the meth lab activities or is subject to arrest for other criminal violations; (iii) ensure immediate medical testing for methamphetamine toxicity; and (iv) arrange for any follow-up medical tests, examinations, or health care made necessary as a result of methamphetamine toxicity.
